Course Context and Overview (100 words):

This course aims to provide a comprehensive overview of what does 'culture' mean in contemporary times. It seeks to obtain a nuanced understanding of how the different socio-political discourses at any given time intersect to constitute individual as well as collective ideologies and perceptions. Accordingly, it will cover the deeper workings of varying discourses such as that of nation, postcoloniality, and gender vis-à-vis an extensive study of theories, texts, and films. The course will thus deconstruct the various grand/ dominant narratives of our society, in turn uncovering how those shape our identities.
