

Lecture 1: Vulnerability Studies: The Key Concepts

by Prof. Pramod K. Nayar, Professor of English, UNESCO Chair in Vulnerability

The Department of Humanities and Social Sciences, LNMIIT, introduced a series of sessions on vulnerability and precarity conducted by Professor Pramod K. Nayar on the 28th of February and the 27th of March 2024. Professor Nayar is a Professor in the Department of English at the University of Hyderabad and a UNESCO Chair in Vulnerability Studies. The sessions provided valuable insight into the complexities of these concepts and their implications in various contexts. In Part 2 of the lecture, This talk examines case studies and examples of vulnerability and precarity in contemporary culture, the representational strategies when depicting the climate crisis, and resilience. The talk brings into the concept of 'traumatic materialism' in the aesthetics of vulnerability. Professor Nayar also introduced concepts like precariat classes, the gig economy, the aesthetics of vulnerability, and much more. He delved into the multifaceted nature of vulnerability and precarity, exploring their intersectionality with socioeconomic, environmental, and political factors. He also educated the participants about how some groups of people are more vulnerable because of their socioeconomic or political conditions. He further stated how 'Vulnerability' has extended its branches to biological processes, disease and infections, natural disasters, and human-made disasters. Professor Nayar also emphasised the importance of understanding the lived experiences of vulnerable populations by presenting compelling examples to illustrate the concepts in different settings. He further elaborated on how there are multiple aesthetic modes through which we represent vulnerability. Overall, these two sessions opened the minds of the participants to delve into the research on vulnerability and how vulnerability is almost related to every sphere of life in general.

The talk ended with an engaging Q&A session and a vote of thanks by Dr. Payel Pal.



A common example when speaking of 'precariat' classes is :

- a shift in the employment scene, from permanent jobs to (a) contractual employment, (b) flexible employment. The 'gig economy' where people work multiple small-time jobs to acquire subsistence incomes.
- a shift from steady incomes to unpredictable income
- the erosion of social safety networks, access to affordable healthcare and education
- the rise of debts
- the rise of 'multidimensional poverty' (standard of living, health, education)
- the absence or erosion of solidarity within the class of workers because everyone is temporary, uncertain and replaceable

Vulnerability and Literary-Cultural Studies

Vulnerability in human and nonhuman lifeworlds is communicated best through literary and cultural texts – whether the novel or disaster films. Vulnerability is *mediated* for us through specific modes (Masschelein et al 2021).

Literary and cultural texts enable us to understand vulnerability because

- They show us individual and collective bodies being rendered open to injury
- They offer descriptions of systemic, intrinsic or social contexts in which these injuries occur
- They develop a language, a representational vocabulary in and through which we can speak of vulnerable people, groups and lifeworlds
- They show us how individuals and groups respond to conditions of vulnerability and thus generate hope or despair depending on how they imagine these responses
- They suggest alternatives to the current scenario where a new world order, social relations, government and attitudes can be imagined – a new social imaginary.
